



Introduction

God has characteristics that are unique to Him. These are attributes which no other created beings share. Knowing these truths is essential for a proper relationship with the Living God.

He Never Changes (Immutability)

"For I, the LORD, do not change; therefore you, O sons of Jacob, are not consumed. (NAS)

Malachi 3:6

Every good thing bestowed and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation, or shifting shadow.

James 1:17

¹⁰ "You, Lord, in the beginning laid the foundation of the earth, and the heavens are the works of Your hands; ¹¹They will perish, but You remain; and they all will become old as a garment, ¹²And like a mantle You will roll them up; like a garment they will also be changed. But You are the same, and Your years will not come to an end. "(NASV)

Hebrews 1:10-12

Change is the natural course of events for created beings. Our bodies and minds are constantly changing. Change for a believer is desirable. But change for God is impossible.

Change implies improvement or decay, getting better or getting worse. A God who is perfect can do neither. To improve would imply that he was not perfect before. To decline would prove that He is not as good now as He was before.

Immutability

The concept that God does not change either in His wisdom, power, holiness, righteousness, love, grace or kindness.

Hebrews 13:8

Consider:

If God were to change in any way, it would be impossible for us to know Him. His unchangeable immutability assures us that He will be consistent with us whether or not we are consistent with Him.

He is Eternal

Ps 90:2-4

The idea that God is eternal involves the truth that He is free from the limits of time. He is the cause of time and is not subject to it.

² Before the mountains were born Or You gave birth to the earth and the world, Even from everlasting to everlasting, You are God. ³ You turn man back into dust And say, "Return, O children of men." ⁴ For a thousand years in Your sight Are like yesterday when it passes by, (NASV)

Psalms 90:2-4

But do not let this one fact escape your notice, beloved, that with the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day.

2 Peter 3:8

- **Everlasting** in the Old Testament means from the remotest time in the past to the remotest time in the future. It indicates the boundaries of time.

⁹"Remember the former things long past, for I am God, and there is no other; I am God, and there is no one like me, ¹⁰declaring the end from the beginning and from ancient times things which have not been done, saying, 'My purpose will be established, and I will accomplish all My good pleasure';(NAS)

Isaiah 46:9-10

Based upon Isaiah 46: 9-10 check \square the things in the following list that can be attributed to the eternal nature of God's existence.

- God, not limited by time, can see the future and the past all at once.
- □ From the very beginning, God knew how everything would end.
- □ No one else sees all things as God does.

God Knows Everything (Omniscient)

God knows Himself and all other things, whether they are actually or merely possible, whether they are past, present or future and He knows perfectly and from all eternity.

Omniscient means all knowing

God's Unique Attributes

The eyes of the LORD are in every place, watching the evil and the good. Proverbs 15:3 Sheol and Abaddon lie open before the LORD, how much more the hearts of men! ¹O LORD, You have searched me and known me. ²You know when I sit down and when I rise up; You understand my thought from afar. ³You scrutinize my path and my lying down, and are intimately acquainted with all my ways. ⁴Even before there is a word on my tongue, Behold, O LORD, You know it all. (NASU) Psalms 139:1-4 Great is our Lord, and abundant in strength; His understanding is infinite. Psalms 147:5

He is Everywhere (Omnipresent)

• Consider Psalms 139:7-10. Circle every physical place where God is found.

⁷ Where can I go from Your Spirit? To be in everyplace at once is a characteristic of God alone. No other created being can occupy every nook and cranny of the creation. Even Satan can only be in one place at a time. Not so God. He fills His creation.

The 139th Psalm declares the very heart of God's Omniscience.

Consider:

The universe extends for billions of light years, and the atom is so small that it cannot be seen. Yet God holds the atom together and he measures the universe with the span of His hand.



Jonah thought that he could hide from God. Look at Jonah Chapter 1 and count the ways God displayed His Unique character as He dealt with the fleeing prophet

He Has All Power (Omnipotent)

God's Omnipotence is essentially His ability to do whatever He wants.

¹³And the LORD said to Abraham, "Why did Sarah laugh, saying, 'Shall I indeed bear a child, when I am so old?' ¹⁴"Is anything too difficult for the LORD? At the appointed time I will return to you, at this time next year, and Sarah shall have a son."

Genesis 18:13-14

"Behold, I am the LORD, the God of all flesh; is anything too difficult for Me?"

Jeremiah 32:27

But He said, "The things impossible with men are possible with God."

Luke 18:27

Isaiah 40 contains a wonderful view of the greatness of God. While the passage focuses on God Power and wisdom, his Immutability, Omnipresence and Eternity are implicitly present.

What effect on the truth of these verses would occur if God were not immutable? To put it another way, If God could change, would you place the same value on these verses as you do now? Why?

Similarly, why is God's Omnipresence essential to the truth of these verses? Could they be true if God could only be in one place at a time?

Finally, why does that fact that God is not limited by time important in these verses? If He were subject to time, would the meaning of these verses change?
